This workshop will address how to integrate the social, economic, and environmental components of sustainability and global learning into any course, regardless of discipline.

Writing-Intensive Courses^

9am-1:30 pm Bayview Room These courses emphasize writing at all levels of instruction and across the curriculum, including final-year projects. Students are encouraged to produce and revise various forms of writing for different audiences in different disciplines. This workshop will discuss the use of frequent, low-stakes writing assignments, peer review of student writing, WI strategies that help you achieve your course learning outcomes.
