AVAILABILITY, LOCATION, AND METHODS TO SUMMON LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTANCE

Enforcement and Arrest Authority

The California State University, East Bay Police Department is located at 25800 Carlos Bee Boulevard, Hayward, California, and provides police services 24 hours a day to our community. Police dispatch can be reached directly 24 hours a day by phone at 510-885-3791. The peace officers of California State University, East Bay have state-wide police authority and jurisdiction per Penal Code 830.2 and Education Code 89560, and are vested with law enforcement powers and responsibilities, identical to the local police or sheriff departments in your home community.

Crime Reporting

The entire university community is strongly encouraged to report any and all known or suspected incidents of criminal activity on the campus to the University Police Department as soon as possible. When calling CSUEB University Police, always:

- Give your name, telephone number and location.
- Give clear and accurate information.
- Be prepared to supply suspect and vehicle description, and direction of travel.
- DON'T HANG UP! Follow the instructions of the dispatcher.

SPECIAL SAFEGUARDS FOR FACILITIES OR ACTIVITIES

Security of and Access to Campus Facilities

All campus facilities are key-accessed, and most are open daily for scheduled campus community use. Access to campus buildings is restricted during non-business hours. Campus buildings are opened by university custodians on weekdays at approximately 7 a.m. and are secured by University Police at approximately 11 p.m.

Access to the Housing and Residential Life Complex is with key access only. Housing policy requires residents to ensure that all doors allowing access to residential buildings remain closed when not in use. Campus key control and distribution is a function of Facilities Services. To provide for the security of campus facilities, the University Police enforces Educational Code 89031 & Housing Policies. Campus facility access may be revoked per Penal Code 626.

Security Considerations Used in Maintenance of Campus Facilities

Regular inspections and surveys of campus indoor/outdoor lighting, shrubbery and walkways are conducted. The University participates in Crime Prevention through Environmental Design concepts for planning and improvements on campus.

Special Event Safety Planning

Preparation for large events on campus involve the creation of Incident Action Plans according to the Standardized Emergency Management System and in collaboration with mutual aid agencies and contracted safety personnel.

New Student Orientations

University Police personnel provide personal safety tips and emergency contact information to new students on a regular basis. Students are informed of policies, voluntary confidential crime reporting procedures, and safety programs.

New Employee Orientations

Throughout the year, University Police personnel present safety policies and procedures to new employees, in cooperation with the Human Resources department. Employees are informed of injury and illness prevention, workplace violence, safety programs, and voluntary confidential crime reporting procedures.

ACTIONS IN THE LAST 18 MONTHS TO INCREASE SAFETY

- Re-deployed personnel to provide increased staffing during the evening shifts.
- Assigned full time staff to assist the Emergency Preparedness Coordinator.
- Distributed 5,000 personal safety alarms to students, faculty and staff.
- Upgraded Public Safety CAD System to provide crime data mapping.
- Provided “Sex Signals” training to over 500 students, facilitated by the DISC, Athletics, and Student Life and Leadership programs
- Provided several “One Love” town hall meetings, facilitated by CSUEB’s Associated Students Inc.
- In order to improve lighting at night, the University Parking Department migrated to LED bulbs in Parking Lots J, L & M.
- Housing collaborated with UPD on putting out warnings regarding important issues happening in Housing that go beyond Clery (hate speech and destruction of property). For example in Fall quarter, UPD and Housing sent out to emails to residents regarding destruction of property and the second one regarding hate speech.
- Improved lighting in Housing in collaboration with Facilities. Housing works with facilities to identify all areas within Student Housing that need additional lighting.
- Added cameras in Tamalpais student housing building stairwell.
- Ran infrastructure in the Shasta and Diablo student housing buildings for additional cameras to be installed in the coming year.
- Added an Emergency Response Center in Student Housing El Dorado Hall, similar to Student Health Services.
- Added additional supplies to Resident Assistants bags for more resourceful response when responding to emergencies such as Building/Area rosters.
- Developed emergency response protocols depending on type of emergencies for Professional-On-Call and Resident Assistants.
- Created an emergency preparedness document for all student housing residents; distributed to all residents, and published on the Student Housing Website.

CHANGES IN SAFETY PRECAUTIONS DURING THE NEXT 24 MONTHS

- Deploying Text to 911 functionality.
- Deploying new alarm/camera technology to reduce thefts and burglaries.
- Continued deployment of LED technology in campus parking lots.
- Developed an “Alcohol and Other Drugs” workshop for students involved in alcohol and marijuana violations, in order to increase bystander intervention and reduce the risk of alcohol and drugs. The training was developed in collaboration with Title IX, Student Conduct, Student Housing & Residence Life and Recreation & Wellness.
