The California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) is the singular general education pathway for California Community College (CCC) students to fulfill lower-division general education requirements necessary for transfer and admission to both the California State University (CSU) and the University of California (UC).

Any course completed in areas 1-6 must be a minimum of 3 semester or 4 quarter units. All general education courses must be completed with a “C” or better grade. Common Course Numbering (CCN) courses are identified with a C before the course number. To learn more about CCN please visit <https://www.cccco.edu>. Courses that are listed in more than one area may only be used to satisfy one general education requirement. Courses on this list may also count towards a specific major. UC GRADUATION REQUIREMENT LANGUAGE OTHER THAN ENGLISH (LOTE)

Students that have not completed the LOTE requirement through High School Coursework (2 years of the same foreign language completed with a “C” grade or better), AP exam, or other criteria determined by the UC, may continue to utilize enrollment in an approved Language other than English course to satisfy this UC graduation requirement.
