

Completion and certification of CSU GE Breadth will permit a student to transfer from Chabot College to a campus in the CSU system without the need, after transfer, to take additional lower-division general education courses. Students are required to complete a minimum of 39 units in areas A - F* for full certification. CSU GE Breadth is not applicable to any campus at the University of California (UC).

If your goal is to complete an AS-T in Biology, please consult a counselor for more information on CSU GE for STEM.

*Students with catalog rights (defined as continuously enrolled in at least one course per academic year) for the 2020-21 academic year or before, are not required to complete Area F.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

MAJOR:

What is CSU GE Breadth?

A general education course pattern created for transfer to any California State University (CSU) campus.

How should I prepare to transfer?

- Explore majors and careers aligned with your motivations for attending college.
- Manage your time. Schedule enough hours to study outside of class time.
- Plan to study two hours per week for each unit enrolled (ex.: 12 units = 24 hours study per week)
- Work for the best grades possible. Earning a higher GPA gives you more options.

What classes do I need to complete for CSU transfer?

- Complete the "Golden Four" > CSU GE Areas A1, A2, A3 and B4.
- Early on, enroll in courses required for your major.
- Some major requirements may also satisfy general education requirements (ie. double-count).
- Whenever possible, choose CSU GE classes of interest.

How do I find the courses required for my major?

Go to ASSIST (www.assist.org). If applicable, complete an Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT) at Chabot College. For ADT degrees, see the Chabot College Catalog and/or DegreeWorks.

What else should I know about CSU GE?

- Each year the CSU GE pattern is updated, so select courses from the current year's agreement.
- Courses that appear in multiple areas may only be counted in one area, except the US History and American Institutions courses, which may also be used for Area D.
- Grades of C- or higher are required for Areas A and B4. Grades of D or higher may be applied in other CSU GE areas.

How can I get more help with transfer?

- Make an appointment with a Chabot College Counselor to develop a Student Educational Plan (SEP) to clarify your goals and to map your course requirements.
- Get involved at Chabot College to enhance college success.
- Meet with transfer reps & attend workshops in the Transfer Center. Attend Chabot College Transfer Day.
- Visit/tour transfer schools.

What is CSU GE certification?

A process in which Chabot College verifies that your CSU GE is completed. After you have accepted an offer of admission to a CSU campus, you must submit a petition to the Chabot Admissions Office requesting CSU GE certification. If CSU GE isn't completed prior to transfer, partial certification of CSU GE is also available. CSU certification is automatic for students who apply for, and earn, AA-T or AS-T degrees.
