### **Session 1: 9:00-9:45 am**

#### **Title: Embodying Your Equity Principles through Arts Integration and Forms of Curricular Play**

**Presenters: Nicole Sumner, Teacher Education**

The arts and forms of play are critical tools in growing the courageous imagination we need to bring about a belief in the possibility of change. Not only do they bring students critical equity-building and empathy-building skills, but educators create more participation, identify student expertise, flip the script, and embrace the tension of tackling difficult conversations. Examples include curricular integration of visual art, music and poetry. Resources include an inquiry-based template for integrating arts and play connections into the equity goals in your syllabus, an X-Y axis of your play history through time, and the Wheel of Arts, Play & Equity Principles. #### **Title: Helping Students in Distress**

Now more than ever before, students are experiencing a high level of stress and anxiety and may be struggling to get their basic needs met. Any staff, faculty, or student may encounter a student who is in need of support. We want our entire community to feel equipped to look out for one another, provide empathetic connection, and to bridge students to support resources whenever needed. In this session, participants will learn strategies to engage students in distress, and will also learn how to bridge students effectively to student support programs - Pioneers for HOPE for basic needs, Student Health and Counseling Services for mental health support, and Confidential Advocate for sexual assault support.

### **Title: Policing in the CSU & Abolitionist Teaching Approaches**

What is the history of policing in the CSU and impacts of police presence? How do we know when to call the police (or NOT)? What are alternatives to police? We'll explore scenarios in group work to develop our abolitionist teaching approaches.

### **Title: The College of Science (CSCI) Math & STEM Lab: Learning Assistant Program**

The CSCI's Math & STEM Lab operates an embedded Learning Assistant (LA) program. Undergraduate LAs partner with faculty to implement active learning pedagogy and to create an inclusive classroom climate. LAs also provide individual and group academic support via drop-in hours. Our goal is to increase student engagement, and ultimately to reduce equity gaps in gateway courses with high DFW rates.

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### **Title: Trauma Informed Teaching and Care Strategies**

Students are entering their classes with a host of personal challenges that impact their ability to learn. Trauma-informed teaching strategies can help us engage students where they are, create spaces to build community, and connect students to the supportive resources that they need. Participants will have the opportunity to share best practices together and brainstorm trauma informed strategies for both remote and in-person learning.

### **Title: Develop Students' Diversity Skills through Course Assignments**

Help students build skills increasing their own cultural self-awareness, learn a broad range of diverse viewpoints, respect diverse perspectives, and reflect on their interactions with diverse people and perspectives in a course assignment through the lens of the ILO Diversity Assignment Guide developed by faculty colleagues across colleges. Review and share considerations for assignment design, and examine example assignment instructions along with a cultural simulation sample assignment that is relevant across disciplines.

### **Title: Integrating Indigenous Land Acknowledgement into our Campus Culture**

Participants will learn about: 1) History: Whose land are we on, and what is the history of erasure and colonization here; 2) Present and Future: How do Ohlone people feel about the land we are on, how are they involved with it, how would they like to be involved with the land that CSUEB is on, how can faculty foster that connection in the future. How to conduct a land acknowledgement in your courses and events in a meaningful, non-performative way; and 3) Following the acknowledgement up with action: Campus-based resources for faculty who want to incorporate Muwekma Ohlone and other indigenous interests and concerns into their syllabi and research.
