Anthropology, B.A. Program (120 units)

Degree Requirements Unit-Outline

- A baccalaureate of arts degree requires a total of 120 units:
 - The major requirements consists of 54-56 units;
 - General Education (GE) & Graduation Requirements (GR) consists of 52 units;
 - Free Electives may consist of 12-14 units (actual number of free elective units may depend on GE/GR units).
