Driven by a dedication to the arts, the Cal State Friends of the Arts organization supports Cal State East Bay's cultural and performing arts.

Throughout the year, CSFA hosts an array of receptions, show openings and other activities related to the arts. In addition to increasing the patronage of CSUEB art activities, CSFA hosts fund-raisers for the organization.

CSFA board member Nancy Hird said she was enthusiastic about the arts on campus.

"Student work is worthy of a lot of attention. You get a chance to see an artist becoming; it is truly exciting," Hird said.

The organization hosted the reception for the Fall Jazz Concert, the opening of the Machu Picchu exhibit in the C.E. Smith Anthropology Museum and numerous dinners before shows.

The funds provide annual scholarships to one student in each of the departments of art, music, and theatre and dance.

When the organization has sufficient funds, it purchases art pieces from students and displays them in the university library.

"The purchase money helps the student artist to get started in their career, and the University Library has kindly consented to exhibit these examples of excellence in the works of our art students," CSFA President Jerry Rose said.

Membership in the organization varies from about 30 to 75 people, with 13 board members who attend meetings, and organize and operate events.

Hird said CSFA welcomes new members. Members receive discounts to events and their membership fee contributes to the scholarship fund.

CSFA's members range from students and faculty of CSUEB to community members interested in supporting the various art programs.

Contribution forms are generally available at events sponsored by CSFA, and membership is obtained after a \$35 or more contribution.

CSFA, founded in 1991 by CSUEB President Norma Rees, is dedicated to increasing patronage, awareness and support of the university's various art programs, Rose said.


